#### Main Objectives:

- 2. Organize peace and community development-oriented visits to Africa.
- Promote educational links and collaborations between African secondary and US high schools.

4. Build a Constituency of Peace Ambassadors and Partners in the US and Africa.

5. Contribute to Peace Leadership Development and a culture of peace initiatives.

6. Support allied organizations and partners in promoting peace, nonviolence and justice in Africa and her Diaspora.

The biennial Youth Peace and Cultural Education Program, scheduled for Ethiopia in the summer of 2014, remains a signature project of Afripeace. The student participants have been educationally and culturally enriched from the previous projects in Ghana, Nigeria and Rwanda. Each of the student travelers has found his/her experience to be personally rewarding as they continue to grow and mature. The stories in this newsletter and the online blogs from the Rwanda 2012 program speak for themselves and only reveal part of the invaluable experience. We look forward to the opportunity of having some of the African youth in the US in future, in what we envision as a two-way exchange program.

Nim attributes her many successes to her parents who emigrated from India and who always fostered in her a deep connection to India and the rest of the world. Nim's journey with Afripeace began in junior high and continued her involvement throughout high school. When the opportunity to travel to Rwanda was presented to her, she couldn't say no. While in Rwanda, Mann worked with street children and had the chance to share stories and experience post-genocide Rwandan culture and life. Nim states, "They're making a movement to really empower women." Nim also stated that the large role women play in Rwanda's culture is why as a nation they are "just much more stable."

### <u>I'm Not Leaving</u>

I recently had the opportunity to interview Carl Wilkens, author of the book I'm Not Leaving. He shared with me the key parts and largest lessons from his experience as the only American who remained in Rwanda during the 1994 Genocide. I asked him several general questions: How did you find a way to talk about your experience? How did you make the decision to stay? Were there ever points that you just wanted to leave and give up? In response to these questions Carl expressed the importance of three main things: stories, presence, and purpose. Stories are how we make connections and how we educate and learn. They are the building blocks of any true human relationship. They are the windows to compassion and shared experience. Presence, sometimes that's all it takes! You don't always necessarily have to be dodging bullets and chasing down the perpetrators to make a difference. There are a lot of times in which just being present makes the biggest difference.



Carl's presence often saved many lives. It's just about being there. Purpose: as long as you have a purpose you are making change. Carl's main purpose was to protect the people in his life in Rwanda. He stayed to protect his friends Anitha and Janvier and because of them he changed so many more lives. Purpose harvests change. Carl and his wife, Teresa, "believe that stories and service are two of the most important tools that every person possesses to build peace".

### 2013 Nigerian Youth Peace Leadership Program

The Nigeria Youth Peace Leadership Workshop was motivated by the need to provide critical leadership skills and knowledge for the youth participants, the future leaders of Nigeria-Africa. The vision of the program centered on positive youth empowerment. The program's main mission was creation of a good foundation for preparation of future or young Nigerian/African leaders for just service and governance that promotes a culture of peace and social justice.



The program resulted from the 2010 JAMS Foundation sponsored pilot project on peace education in schools in Imo state, which led to the creation of school peace clubs. The August 5-9 2013 program trained 50 youth participants from high schools, colleges and universities in Imo, Abia, Enugu, Ebonyi and Anambra states of Nigeria, including several Nigeria federal universities. The program was sponsored by Afripeace Foundation, with collaboration from Missionage Development Initiative, Nigeria, Young Negotiators and Mediators of Nigeria, and directed by Prof. Ernest Uwazie in cooperation with Mr. Kenneth Njoku (Nigeria), with 10 guest speakers on

various topics and 5 teacher guides. The participants resided in the hostels of the host institution, Government Secondary School, Owerri, Imo state.



By the end of the program, the participants were able to develop their own CV and personal statement, gain critical conflict mediation and employment skills, establish important networks, and learn about critical leadership styles and opportunities through lectures, role plays, individual assignments, group exercises, interactions with select guests, field trips and participant presentations.

Nigeria peace leadership workshop contd!

Some reflections and promises from the workshop participants:

"I have been motivated to take the message of peace to the campuses...around the southeast zone of Nigeria, training student leaders, class representatives on good leadership. I want to embark on what I call "the Cell Spread Project" on youth leadership development focus on peace and conflict resolution (Okoye, Chidera--recent university graduate).

"..When I go home I will teach my family the importance of peace, ...and that when eating don't talk.."(Raymond Chiamaka Peacejunior high school student).

"...With these lectures on peer mediation and conflict resolution as well as leadership..., my heart and mind have been enlightened to propagate....peace wherever I go.... To my young colleagues....no knowledge is a waste. You may not have understood some of the lectures and how to apply them in your immediate setting... Please keep these (your-emphasis added) notes safe as some day you are upto age and revisit them they will be of great help to you."(Orji Isaac, final year undergraduate student).
